

### President's Welcome Message

I am excited to welcome you to the 81st Annual Meeting of the Rural Sociological Society! I fondly remember my first RSS meeting in Portland – which took place 20 years ago and was on the theme "Beyond Politics: Rethinking the Future of Democracy". Plus ca change, plus c'est la même ca change, plus c'est la meme chose, non?

Rural people and places have been much in the news since the 2016 US Election, and the work presented at this years' meeting represents one of the most important compendia of research on rural topics and problems anywhere in the world. Our program has a packed schedule of paper and panel sessions that address a wide range of topics reflecting the diverse interests and disciplinary expertise of our members. I continuously marvel at the depth and breadth of our society's contributions to rural scholarship. While we are a relatively small society, we swing big.

Aside from the abundance of research that reflects the ongoing work of our RSS community, this year's meeting has several special events to which I want to draw your attention:

- The meeting theme is "Science in Society, Society in Science Toward a 21st Century Model for Social Scientific Research" and a number of organized sessions will explore the tensions between society, scientific research, and other sources of knowledge. Our keynote speaker is Dr. Jill Belsky from the University of Montana. Dr. Belsky has deep roots in rural sociology and has also been a leading practitioner of an engaged and participatory approach to research and scholarship on natural resource management and indigenous communities. Our other plenary session will bring together representatives of our various Research and Interest Groups (RIGs) who will give lightening talks to highlight how science, methods, and engaged scholarship are addressed by their members.
- Friday night we will screen three documentary films on important rural topics: community struggles over dam removals, survival of local farms in the face of urban development, and gentrification and inequality in Portland. Each will include opportunities to engage with the film's director (and with some of the people profiled in the film). Plan to come.
- Saturday evening we will have our traditional 'Department Night' at the Oregon Museum of Science and Technology (OMSI), complete with a visit to a new exhibit on robotics. Many thanks to the departmental sponsors for this event.
- We also have several pre-organized collections of papers and/or panels that explore important rural topics. These include sessions on the distinctive dynamics of rural people and places in the American West, a coordinated program exploring Rural Queer Voices that highlight the experiences and perspectives of rural residents with diverse gender identities and sexual orientations, and much more.

Most of all, I want to thank the Program Chair (Kate MacTavish), our RSS VP (Lisa Pruitt), RSS Executive Director (Cindy Struthers), RSS Business Office Manager (Sandy Wittig), and our RIG Chairs for their countless hours spent organizing this meeting. We hope you enjoy the result!







### **Plenary Speaker**



Jill Belsky

Jill Belsky received her PhD in Rural/Development Sociology from Cornell University in 1991, and has been a faculty member at the University of Montana ever since, initially in the Department of Sociology and later in the Department of Society and Conservation, which she helped to create. Her research and teaching over the decades have focused on the intersections of rural change, livelihoods, farming systems and environmental politics and policies, including governance of community-owned and managed forests. She has worked in Southeast Asia, Belize, Bhutan and western Montana. She directed the Bolle Center for People and Forests (2004-2014) and served as Editor-in-Chief of the journal, Society & Natural Resources (2012-2014).

Her plenary talk will highlight her decade-long involvement with the Blackfoot Challenge (a local watershed organization), The Nature Conservancy, and various public land agencies, politicians and residents in the Blackfoot Valley of Montana who have responded to corporate timberland divestment and landscape/community fragmentation through purposeful acquisition, including creating and managing a community conservation area. She will speak specifically about tensions as an "engaged scholar" addressing market-created/privatization problems with market-based/privatization solutions, making necessary negotiations between critical analyses and practical concerns, and the joy of participating in collective action for progressive goals and public goods.

### Research and Interest Groups (RIGS)

What are Research and Interest Groups? Research and Interest Groups (RIGs) reflect the substantive interests of RSS Members and serve as an important avenue for connecting members with similar interests. RIGs serve a critical role in RSS including: identifying, developing, and recruiting for the annual RSS conference; planning special events, speakers, field trips for the annual conference; providing intellectual leadership in their respective areas; rewarding achievement through internal awards and recognitions; and creating opportunities for members, particularly graduate students, to network and identify colleagues with similar interests.

### **Applied and Extension**

The Applied and Extension RIG focuses on identifying opportunities for rural sociologists in non-academic or non-traditional academic professional positions. This is accomplished through activities at the annual meetings that: (1) Highlight professional opportunities; and (2) Illustrate the ways in which rural sociological knowledge and skills contribute to an understanding and enhancement of organizational and community processes.

### Community, Health and Family

The Community, Family and Health RIG is a multidisciplinary community of scholars interested in engaging in the open exchange of ideas, collaborative research, and promoting teaching with the principal objectives of improving the quality of life of rural communities, both domestic and international.

### Youth, Education, and Rural Vitality

The Youth, Education and Rural Vitality RIG consists of scholars interested in examining the interrelationships between the education and well-being of youth, communities, and rural vitality. Important sociological questions at the community and societal levels are central, but the group also examines the impact of policy (local and non-local) on youth opportunity and outcomes, community vitality, and school organization and impact. We also welcome demographic analysis and change and examination of economic and community development.

### Natural Resources Research Group

Provides a forum for scholars and others interested in the sociology of natural resources and the environment.

### **Population**

The purpose of the Population RIG is to promote research, disseminate knowledge, exchange ideas, and foster teaching on the demographic study of rural populations within the context of sociology. The Population RIG welcomes members of all theoretical and methodological persuasions and embraces work that considers causes and consequences of rural population processes in all institutions and social contexts.

### **Rural Gender Issues**

The Rural Gender Issues RIG is committed to the expansion and transmission of knowledge about women, gender, and sexuality in rural places by acting as a liaison among scholars and activists interested in those issues and by providing a support network among women and individuals of diverse socioeconomic and racial backgrounds, sexual orientations, gender identities and physical challenges within RSS and beyond.

### Research and Interest Groups (RIGS)

### **Rural Poverty**

The Rural Poverty RIG welcomes, fosters, and promotes research from diverse theoretical perspectives and methodological approaches that contributes to a broad understanding of the dynamic intersecting factors that produce and perpetuate conditions of poverty for rural individuals, families, communities, and regions in both the United States and in other nations.

### **Rural Policy**

### **Rural Studies**

The focus of the Rural Studies RIG is to: (1) Facilitate the multidisciplinary research and study of rurality, and (2) Connect scholars interested in rural issues to share information and promote collaborative endeavors.

### **Rural Racial Ethnic Minorities**

The mission of the rural Racial and Ethnic Minorities RIG is to facilitate the creation and dissemination of knowledge about the dynamics, causes, and consequences of racial and ethnic relations in rural areas. By supporting the formation of collaborative networks among scholars, and between scholars and rural minority communities, the RIG contributes to the development of strategies and policies to reduce racial and ethnic inequalities.

### Senior Rural Sociologists

"Senior" is defined as anyone who feels they are relatively advanced in their careers. You do not have to be at least 55 years old, like for AARP! You do not have to have tenure, tons of publications, or be famous! It would be good if you remember the Vietnam War!

### Sociology of Agriculture and Food (SAFRIG)

SAFRIG consists of a community of scholars interested in the study of issues related to related to agriculture and food, including but not limited to labor and production processes, distribution and markets, structures of inequality (race, gender, class), states and policy, knowledge and technology, and global and local change.

### Teaching and Curriculum

The Teaching and Curriculum RIG aims to improve undergraduate and graduate instruction in rural sociology by: (1) Examining and sharing teaching best practices; (2) Discussing rural sociology curricula and the curricular roles of related courses, both within and outside formal rural sociology programs; (3) Fostering and recognizing professional development in teaching, emphasizing but not limited to teaching assistants and early career faculty; and (4) Enhance the value attached to instruction within the discipline.

### International Development and Studies (IDEaS)

Expands the knowledge of rural sociologists through interactions with scholars and organizations serving rural people and places throughout the world. This includes comparative and theoretical work informed by the diverse scholarship and histories of rural areas in all countries. Our work includes understanding the complexities of international migration flows, the situations faced by refugees, poverty and inequality, health, sustainability, development initiatives, and the policies and practices that enhance people's lives.

This workshop will define the Census Bureau's definition of urban, so that an understanding of the definition of rural is easy to deduce. 

At the 2019 Annual Meetings of the Rural Sociological Society (RSS), we will explore a myriad of theoretical perspectives, sociocultural practices, and political actions concerning justice and tyranny.

This theme is timely because many RSS members are involved in various research, curricular, and outreach initiatives nationally and internationally to understand the justice and ethics of agriculture, the food system, natural resource extraction, healthcare, government, and criminal justice to name just a few.
